### KEY DEFINITIONS:

The following list of words with their definitions will give us a shared vocabulary for our discussions.

Biblical Justice	“Seeks to protect individual liberty while promoting personal responsibility. It is the equitable and impartial application of the rule of God’s moral law in society; identifies the moral standard by which God measures human conduct. It is the impartial application of God’s moral law within all realms of society including economic, political, social, or criminal justice.” (Isa. 1: 17) ( <i>Devotional Biblical Justice</i> by Tony Evans)
Conciliation	the process of adjusting or settling disputes in a friendly manner through extra judicial means; bringing two sides together to reach a compromise
Reconciliation	restoration of friendly relations; the act of making one view or belief compatible with another
Racism	Policies, actions, and inactions that enforce the belief that groups of humans possess different behavioral traits corresponding to physical appearance and can be divided by the superiority of one over the other
Racist	(n. And adj.) - something or someone that, through action or inaction, affirms or creates inequity between particular racial or ethnic groups
Anti-racist	a person who opposes racism and promotes racial tolerance
Systematic	(v.) - done or acting toward a fixed plan or system; methodical
Systemic	(adj.) - relating to or common to a system
White supremacy	(n.) - the belief that white people constitute a superior race and should therefore dominate society, typically to the exclusion or detriment of other racial and ethnic groups, in particular Black or Jewish people
Privilege	(n.) - a special right, advantage, or immunity granted or available only to a particular person or group

# DEVOTIONALS

## THE IMAGE OF GOD

### **Gen. 1: 26, 27; Acts 17:23**

*In theology, we call this Imago Dei - referring to the concept that humans are created in God's image. An image is a mirror or a reflection. This also means that everybody, regardless of their race or ethnicity has intrinsic value and worth. Dignity is innate. All humans are born with esteem because they are created in the image of God.*

*Therefore, any form of racism, elitism, discrimination, or oppression is not only a social issue, but it's a sin issue at its core. By treating a fellow image-bearer inferior because they are of a different race is sin. And if we are going to achieve unity, the first thing we must do is speak honestly. That is, we must call any form of racism, elitism, discrimination, or oppression exactly what it is - sin. God can only begin the healing and unifying process when sin is addressed. Let's begin to treat each other as image-bearers -- people made in the image of God almighty.*

### **Romans 15:30; Eph. 6:18**

*"God went looking for someone to pray or stand in the gap for sinful Jerusalem, but I believe we can apply these words to our lives as well. Did you notice God said, 'I looked for someone'? It could be that you are that someone who could stand in the gap for another person.*

*Paul understood the power of standing in the gap. He implored his friends in Rome to pray for him. 'I urge you, brothers and sisters, by our Lord Jesus Christ and by the love of the Spirit, to join me in my struggle by praying to God for me.' (Romans 15:30, NIV).*

*The Greek word Paul uses for 'struggle' in Romans 15:30 is sunagonizomai, which means 'to struggle in company of, i.e., to be a partner (assistant), strive together with.' The root word means 'to endeavor to accomplish something: fight, labor fervently, strive.'*

*Agreeing to pray for someone isn't simply a nice platitude letting them know we're thinking of them or a pat on the back to cheer them on. When we tell someone we'll pray for them, we agree to put on God's armor and head to the front lines of battle on their behalf.*

*Many ancient shields had brackets attached to the sides. These brackets were a type of latch that soldiers used to lock their shields together during battle. When locked together, the soldiers moved as one, forming a barricade against the enemy. Alone, the shield was a small defense. Hooked together, they were a human wall.*

*When we lock arms in prayer with our friends, we lock our shields together and form a strong wall of defense. That's what my friend Mary did for me that night, and that's what we can do for each other.*

*Ephesians 6:18, 'And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people.' (NIV)*
